Pulling Back the Curtain in the Building of CNY Rotary

The CNY Rotary steering committee has many updates to share as we inch closer to our July 1, 2024, launch. We are sharing this important information so everyone knows all that is happening. After you read this article, be sure to <u>follow us on Facebook</u> [https://www.facebook.com/cnyrotary] or <u>Instagram</u> [https://www.instagram.com/cnyrotary/] for ongoing updates too!

-An org chart is now available to help you understand the layout of our leadership team.

-Key committees have started meeting with the volunteers who came forward over the summer. As they identify any gaps or needs in filling each committee, we will share those openings for you to consider in the new year.

-The Foundation Committee is planning a series of three virtual **Grants Management Seminars** starting in January. Attendance at these seminars is a requirement for a club to qualify to apply for a grant. There may be slight changes to the application process from what you are used to, especially in a new district, which means it's extra important to attend!

-New committees for Events and Service are being built thanks to creative teams from around the region. A call to help fill these committees will be coming early next year, too.

-The steering committee is **working on our Leadership Guide.** This guide, along with the adoption of the RI bylaws, will serve as the policies and procedures for our region.

-We are **connecting with all current Assistant Governors** about transitioning to become Area Representatives in our new approach to serving clubs (it's not too different since AG's are already rockstars!).

-The Finance Committee is **starting work on our 2024-25 budget**, which will be a team effort in order to marry the finances of the three current districts. We **still need a treasurer** and are hoping to recruit co-treasurers to help divvy up the work.

-CNY Rotary Youth Exchange is off and running, having just completed the outbound interviews to select the 2024-25 class. They are also working on updates to their website and continuing to fill their committee vacancies. -We will transition to a singular CNY Rotary RYLA program in 2025. RYLA was already in the works to take place in the spring for D7190, so that will continue as usual. D7170 and D7150 will be exploring a joint event for late June or early July.

-District Training Assembly, also known by some as Super Saturday, will be held April 6, 2024. Save the date - details to come!

-Empire Multi-District PETS (training for Club Presidents and more!) has opened registration for their March 15-17, 2024, in-person training weekend in Syracuse. <u>Click here</u> [https://www.rotaryempiremdpets.org/] to register. -CNY Rotary will **need a new ShelterBox representative** as our current ones are retiring. If this Rotary partner program is a passion of yours, reach out to us to discuss what this might entail. Training and mentorship will be provided.

-President-Elect Lizzy is **looking for a conference location and chairperson for the spring of 2025**. As we move to a single committee for this event (as opposed to this year's tri-district committee), the chairperson will need to be an adept event planner who can lead a regional team. If that's you, please out to Lizzy directly at

<u>rotarylizzy@gmail.com</u> to discuss! The new Events Committee is exploring facilities large enough for our group, but is open to suggestions, which can also be sent to Lizzy.

Opioid Epidemic

Six years ago, our district was awarded a Rotary Global Grant that addressed the opioid epidemic within the seven counties that we serve. The funding was directed to educate our communities about the dangers of opioid use through a media campaign, a program in the schools, the purchase of equipment for the Addiction Center of Broome County and the placement of kiosks for unused drugs.

Unfortunately, the opioid epidemic is still impacting many people across the globe including own families and friends. According to the new data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, opioid deaths continue to kill more than 136 Americans each day. There is, however, a way in which we as Rotarians can make an impact by saving the lives of those affected. This is called Narcan/Naloxone -a nasal spray that can reverse the overdose from opioids.

Realizing the importance of addressing this crisis, several members of our Global Grant

Committee met with Carmela Pi rich, Executive Director of the Addiction Center of Broome County and Marissa Knapp, Overdose Prevention Coordinator for Broome County's Health Department. They guided us through a plan that would enable us to apply for a Rotary Global Grant. This grant would fund the placement of Narcan/Naloxone boxes throughout our seven counties. A picture of the box is below. These boxes would contain Narcan/Naloxone kits with instructions for use. It would be installed and maintained by the Addiction Center of Broome County free of charge.

In order for this to happen, we need your help. We are asking you to identify places where the boxes could be placed -a location that would be accessible for those in need such as community centers, libraries, restaurants, stores, schools, churches and even more so venues that would be located within the rural areas of our district. We need you to ask their owners or directors to consider having a box installed in their facility. If they agree, let us know and we will contact them with further information. This is an opportunity to make a difference in our communities and to save lives. Thank you for your help -we look forward to hearing from you.

Burma School Lives On

Nearly 30 Rotary Clubs in District 7170 took an active role between 2010 and 2014 to support a school for the poorest of the poor in central Burma (Myanmar). Mainly done under the nose and behind the back of the country's military dictators, our efforts helped grow a school of grades 1 and 2, with 46 students, to a school with grades 1-10 and 420 students in 2014.



We sent donations for school supplies, medical gowns and medicines for the clinic, overhead projectors and transparencies, over half a ton (1,086 pounds) of new English Reader textbooks for grades K-6, tens of thousands of doses of Folic Acid to help prevent birth defects, building of a toilet facility for the students so they wouldn't have to use an open field, socks/shirts/hats for the kids for the colder months, sandals for year round, and much more. And we gave them hope! They couldn't believe that people in the United States of America cared about them.

Today, the Burma School is growing and has 684 students because local parents are taking their children out of the other local schools, which are run by the military. The Burma School Lives On! For those of you who helped a decade ago, your efforts are continuing to pay dividends. Sons and daughters of students who graduated a decade ago now attend the same school, which probably would not exist today were it not for your efforts. Thank you!

Climate Action Notes

Reduce ... Reduce ... Reduce

Winter is here!!

Our energy usage does change with the seasons and there are many ways we can reduce our carbon footprint and stay comfortable in cold weather! Short term

Have your heating system serviced. It will save money and energy when running optimally regardless of the fuel.

Use window blinds to help keep the house warm at night.

Install smart thermostats. This way you can warm the house only where you need it and when you need it. **Use blankets & sweaters** so you can keep the temperature lower. [*Editor: I love snuggling under a blanket!*] **Don't idle cars forever**... ask any decent mechanic... engines are ready go in less than a minute of starting so there is no need to 'warm up' the engine. Start the car first and, when you are done clearing the windows, the interior will be warm enough.

Turn off unused lights. With more hours of darkness, you use them more and forget more!

Get those shovels out! Shoveling is great exercise, uses no fuel, and provides some quiet time. If you have a medical condition that prevents you from shoveling, use a battery power snow blower, share a snow blower with a neighbor, or have a service clear your property. As kids, my two brothers and I made pocket money shoveling. Our mother frequently gave us one or two addresses we were to do first and take no money! Doing for others started early in the Kurtz family. Also, keep an eye on neighbors and help out where you can.

Long term

Install new windows. Leaky/drafty windows are one of the main sources of heat loss.

Switch to a whole house heat pump or mini split. This will significantly reduce your carbon footprint while provide heating AND cooling.

Upgrade your insulation. There are many programs to help you determine what is needed and to help you get it installed.

Oneonta Rotary

Oneonta Rotary ushered in the busy month of November with the Oneonta City Halloween Parade on October 31st—an event that Oneonta Rotary helped to create over 80 years ago. This year's parade found Oneonta Rotarians judging costumes, marching in the parade and handing our cider and donuts to marchers at the end of the parade.

On November 5th, Oneonta Rotary was thrilled to bring the District 7170 Foundation Lunch to the Foothills Performing Arts Center in Oneonta. Oneonta's Operation Warm Project was one of several district grant projects featured at the event.

Just two days later, on the 7th, Oneonta Rotarians came together to sort over 200 new winter coats for this year's Operation Warm. The Operation Warm project, which began in 2009, is dedicated to keeping children warm throughout the long Oneonta winter by providing brand new winter coats to those with the greatest need. Beginning on the 8th, the coats were distributed to four area schools. From fundraising to ordering, receiving the shipment, sorting and repackaging, and



finally distributing the coats, the entire process takes almost four months. Judging from the smiling faces, it is all worth it.!



Finally, with flags waving from car windows and horns honking, Oneonta Rotarians took to the roadways from Oneonta to Unadilla on Saturday, November 11 to honor our club veterans. The parade of cars stopped at each veteran's house and placed an American flag in the ground in front of the house. The Rotary Veterans Parade began in May of 2020 when the Oneonta City Memorial Day Parade was canceled due to the COVID pandemic. Rosalie Higgins and Scott Davis wanted to make sure that our

club veterans were recognized, so they created the first Oneonta Rotary Veterans Parade. Two years later, the parade was moved to Veterans Day in November to better align the celebration with the holiday.

On a crisp November morning Owego Rotarians and representatives of the Coburn Free Library dedicated the second part of an enhancement project to improve the once unused area behind the historic building in Owego, NY.



An eleven-foot square covered gazebo was erected by a Rotary work team near the accessible main entrance. This provides a covered area for programs, performances, and activities for children and their families. A Rotary Foundation grant fulfilled through Rotary District 7170 was the main source of funding along with financial support from Owego Rotary Club and Coburn Free Library.



In 2022, another Rotary District Grant enabled Owego Rotarians to build benches and plant a shade tree in the same garden area. This added a comfort level and a focal point for the Memorial Reading Garden which was installed by and is maintained by The Friends of the Coburn Free Library.

Multiple groups working together have allowed these project additions to increase the usability and visual impact of the space. The space is now transformed into a useful and pleasurable area at the accessible entrance to the building where patrons of all ages can participate in activities, rest, read and enjoy library-sponsored community events.



Join the Rotary Book Club of CNY

While he catches his breath, Jack Prior reflects upon the tumultuous winter fifty years before when he served as a battalion surgeon with the 10th Armored Division in Patton's Third Army in 1944, during what became known as the Battle of the Bulge. The events that led up to the battle are well documented: the Allied invasion of Europe at Normandy on June 6th of that year; the rout of German forces across France, Belgium, and Luxembourg during the summer and autumn of 1944; and the unexpected German attack through the heavily-forested Ardennes in Luxembourg and Belgium in December that caused a vast bulge in the Allied lines and lent the battle its name. The counteroffensive was Hitler's all-out gamble to break through thinly-held American lines; capture transportation hubs and fuel depots to accelerate his heavily armored forces; cross the River Meuse; retake the vital seaport of Antwerp; split the Allied armies in the field; and sue for peace on the Western Front.



The club launches November 1

with the inaugural book selection about Central New York WWII veteran Dr. Jack Prior and two heroic Belgian nurses who saved countless American lives during the Battle of the Bulge.
